






# Career-related courses in public high schools




# Extremely/very important items in school quality

National totals, 2017




# Most important factor in school quality






# Importance of standardized tests and interpersonal skills




# Preference on decision making when school has been failing

National totals, 1993-2017




The question: Do you favor or oppose allowing students and parents to choose a private school to attend at public expense?

\*Note: The term voucher is used in the report to mean public expense or public funding, which were the terms used during polling.




# Where would you send your child if cost and location of school were not an issue?


# Effect of vouchers on quality of public schools


# Vouchers: Public education fund allocation


# Importance of diversity in public schools
